

Palmar grasp

- A primitive reflex (present at birth).
- Usually disappears by six months of age.
- · It is characterized by a fully awake infant folding their fingers and clinging to the examiner's pen, probe, or fingers when their palm is stroked.
- · The thumb is not involved in this grasp.



Radial palmar grasp

- Develops at around six to eight months of age.
- · The held object is supported by fingers on the top and the thumb on the side.

Raking

- Develops at around ten months of age.
- · Characterized by the sweeping motion of all fingers to pick up an object.

Inferior pincer grasp

- Develops between 10 to 12 months. The baby uses pads of the index finger and the thumb to grab
- things.

Superior pincer grasp



- Develops at around 12 months of age. · The baby can use their index finger and thumb to pick an
- object with a better grip. · With a developed pincer grasp, the baby can begin self-
- feeding.
